ALEXANDER ROSE MEMORIAL AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN CREATIVE WRITING

The Alexander Rose Memorial Award for Excellence in Creative Writing recognizes a graduating student in the Creative Writing Specialization whose creative work and contributions to the program have been recognized as outstanding by the faculty. The award is given by the Rose family in honor of Alexander Rose, UB Professor Emeritus of English.

BEATRICE KANIGEL PRIZE FOR LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE

The Beatrice Kanigel Prize for Language and Literature is made possible by Robert Kanigel, a local author and former writer in residence in the Klein Family School of Communications Design. The award is in memory of his mother, who could recite Shakespearean sonnets from memory, read voluminously all her life, and inspired her three children, two of whom became writers or journalists. The prize recognizes an undergraduate or graduate student's achievement in writing—in any genre: creative, journalistic, or scholarly—or in the theatrical arts.

Brandy McCluskey will graduate from UB in May 2016 with a B.A. in English, Creative Writing Specialization. An energetic and articulate student, Brandy has a high level of intellectual curiosity and an impressive breadth of knowledge. She can always be counted on to bring new and interesting perspectives to class discussion, and is unfailingly steadfast in presenting and supporting her arguments. Professor Marion Winik notes that Brandy's writing "shows lyricism, selfawareness and humor," and Professor Kendra Kopelke explains that as editor of the literary magazine Welter, Brandy approached her job with "seriousness of purpose and gusto." She truly embodies the creative spirit and energy of the English program! The faculty of the Klein Family School of Communications Design selected her to receive both the Rose and Kanigel awards.



BETTY TARPLEY TURNER AWARD

The Betty Tarpley Turner Award is presented annually to the graduating English major who, in the opinion of the faculty, has the most distinguished record as a student of literature. The award is given by H. Mebane Turner, long-time president of UB, in honor of his mother who was an avid fan of literature.

CHARLES FISHER AWARD

digital communication




integrated arts

jurisprudence

psychology

With a B.A. in Psychology. Hilary's class performance consistently impressed her instructors: Professor Kris Eyssell notes a pamphlet Hilary created of local support services for victims of intimate partner violence and sexual abuse is now in use in UB's Counseling Center. Professor Michael Frederick explains that, even as an undergraduate in a graduate-level course, Hilary's work ethic and class contributions put many of the other students to shame. In addition to her work in class, Hilary also served as president of UB's chapter of Psi Chi, the international honor society in Psychology, and contributed in the lab to every stage of the research process, including presenting research at a conference. simulation and digital entertainment

Leah Jennings graduated in spring 2015 after finishing a successful Simulation and Digital Entertainment capstone project, during which she showed true flexibility by taking roles of both team lead and 3D modeler on two separate projects. She also received the Robert L Bogomolny Award for Undergraduate Creative Achievement at UB's Inspired Discoveries Undergraduate Research Day for her work with Kids Team Baltimore, having researched and designed a child-friendly video game controller. Before coming to UB, she had already won a Maryland Distinguished Scholar Award for Visual Art in 2010. Professionally, she has worked as an Illustrator and Graphic Designer at Promise International; as an Illustrator for Boutique of Quality Books Publishing Company, Inc.; and as a graphic designer for UB, Spark Experience, and, currently, Alchemy Learning.
