Driver's license suspensions for traffic-related debt

SCOPE

292,865 Maryland residents had their driver's licenses suspended between 2015-2019.

Of these, 10% of residents (29,331) have suffered suspension because of failure to pay ("FTP") traffic-related debt.

Suspension data comes from: MVA.

Population data comes from: Maryland.gov and US Census.

17,821 black residents had their license suspended due to FTP.

That is 1 in every 105 black residents.


30% OF LICENSE SUSPENSIONS FOR FTP CONSIST OF WHITE RESIDENTS,

YET WHITE RESIDENTS MAKE UP 59% OF THE MARYLAND POPULATION.

8,754 white residents had their license suspended due to FTP.

That is 1 in every 408 white residents.
